PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Matthew 21:28-32

"Amen, I say to you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." To the ears of the chief priests and elders to whom he was speaking, it was as good as saying, "You're bigger sinners than the biggest sinners around." At least the "sinners" heard and heeded John the Baptist's message of repentance. But those who considered themselves too righteous to repent were missing the opportunity to experience the healing power of mercy.

As we know, God the Father wants to extend mercy to his children. One way God invites us to spiritual healing is through the sacrament of reconciliation. He invites, encourages, assists, and persists in drawing us in, but ultimately the choice is ours. Let us beware of thinking that we aren't the kinds of sinners that really need to repent. If we don't acknowledge our need for God's forgiveness, we become like the chief priests who closed themselves off to God's healing.

Justice Notes:

Social justice is both an attitude and a practical response based on the principle that everyone should look at another person as another self. Solidarity with others at every level is a way of accomplishing this. Solidarity takes many forms: "solidarity of the poor among themselves, between rich and poor, of workers among themselves, between employers and employees in a business, solidarity among nations and peoples" (CCC, no. 1941).

Pope Francis echoes this teaching and clarifies it in his exhortation, Joy of the Gospel (Evangelii Gaudium, 201): "No one must say that they cannot be close to the poor because their own lifestyle demands more attention to other areas. This is an excuse commonly heard in academic, business or professional, and even ecclesial circles. While it is *quite true that the essential vocation and mission of* the lay faithful is to strive that earthly realities and all human activity may be transformed by the Gospel, none of us can think we are exempt from concern for the poor and social justice." Evangelical author Shane Claiborne states, "The great tragedy in the church is not that rich Christians do not *care* about the poor but that rich Christians do not know the poor." Are you a Christian that does not *know* a poor person? Soon we will expand our social justice ministries at SS. Peter & Paul; this might enable you be a friend to someone outside your box. It will change the trajectory of your life.
