

Word

God's word invites us to encounter God

Fifty years ago, on Oct. 11, 1962, Pope John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Council, saying in his remarks, "The whole of history and of life hinges on the person of Jesus Christ." As we use this anniversary to mark the beginning of a Year of Faith, called for by Pope Benedict XVI, we do so as part of a larger effort known as the new evangelization. This effort, our pope tells us, is not a formula but first and foremost a "profound experience of God." This, then, is a season for renewed conversion to the Lord. This is a time our Church is giving us to focus our efforts to reach out not just to those who do not know the Lord, but to those of us who have known him and grown weary or cold in responding in faith. We are being given an opportunity to warm our hearts in word and sacrament (Luke 24:26-32). Giving attention to Abraham, Sarah, Mary and the woman at the well will help us consider the variety of faithful ways that we might respond to God's call. Considering how God is pictured walking in the Garden of Eden or speaking through the prophets or listening to our honest prayers will remind us of the personal ways we experience God in the course of our lifetimes. And in countless ways, we will be reminded of the value of the community of faith in nurturing one another along the way. There are many ways to celebrate this year, and many ways to educate ourselves throughout this time. Perhaps, however, there is no better way to cultivate a culture of witness than to revisit the sacred texts that serve as our foundation. In this letter to the church in Rome, St. Paul the Evangelist reminds his listeners that all who call upon the Lord will be saved. He goes on to remind them of the duty of believers in this work of salvation: "But how can they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how can they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone to preach? And how can people preach unless they are sent?... Faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:14-15, 17). Our challenge in this year is to set aside time to read and pray with the words of Scripture. Join a Bible study group, spend time in daily personal Bible reading, use writings such as this to stir your imagination and deepen your commitment to grow in your relationship with God. The late Bishop Charles Buswell, formerly of Pueblo, Colo., was present at Vatican II, and joined with a group of U.S. bishops in a study group preparing the document on Scripture. He said of the experience, "I came to an understanding of the beauty and of the power of God's word that I had never had before. I began to see in the holy Scripture the actual presence of the Lord. I began to realize that while pondering this word, the power of God and of his love would sink deep into my mind and heart to transform me into the kind of person my Christian vocation called me to be." In this year of Faith, we too can discover the beauty and power of God's transformative word. Like Bishop Buswell, we can become witnesses once again to the God we encounter there.

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

"Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles. They were all together in Solomon's portico. None of the others dared to join them, but the people esteemed them. Yet more than ever, believers in the Lord, great numbers of men and women, were added to them."

The story of the early church, as related in the Acts of the Apostles, not only records what happened, but motivates us today, to continue the apostolic work. We sometimes fail to see that our hands are the hands of the apostles, or even the hands of Christ working in our world today. Do you remember the story of the reconstructed chapel destroyed by bombs in Europe? American Gls restored almost everything, but a shattered statue of the Sacred Heart lacked fingers and hands. They wisely placed a sign in you, our faithful and loving front of the icon reading 'I have no hands but yours.'

> We are the hands of the Lord, because we are baptized, missionary disciples. A kind word, a gracious invitation, a gentle reminder of the love of Jesus to one who is hurting or lonely, can restore the church in the heart of someone. Reach out! April is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Ten tips for protecting children and offering outreach to Victims/Survivors.

1. Sexual abuse is about the victim.

Many people are affected by abuse but the individual most Impacted is the victim who has suffered a violation of trust that can affect his or her entire life.

2. The residual effects of having been abused can last a lifetime.

The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place. Those who have been abused can heal, but it often takes time, therapy, and the support of loved ones.

3. No one has the right to have access to children

No one, no matter who they are, has an automatic right to be around children who are in the care of the Church without proper screening and without following the rules.

- 4. Common Sense is not all that common. Diocese, schools, parishes and especially families, must educate themselves and others on how to protect children.
- 5. Child Sexual abuse can be prevented. It is critical to build safety barriers around children and young people to keep them from harm—such as protective

guardians, codes of conduct, background evaluations, policies and procedures and safety training programs.

- 6. **Feeling heard leads toward healing.** Relief from hurt and anger often comes when one feels heard, when one's pain and concerns are taken seriously, and a victim/survivor's suffering, pain and anger are acknowledged.
- 7. **You cannot always predict who will be an abuser.** Experience shows that most abuse is committed by someone who has gained the trust of a victim/survivor and his/her family.
- 8. **There are behavioral warning signs of child abusers.** Some abusers isolate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lavish gifts, others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approve, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling.
- 9. **People can be taught to identify grooming behavior.** Grooming behaviors are the actions which abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into an inappropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.
- 10. **Background checks are important.** Background checks in churches, schools and other organizations keep predators away from children both because they scare off some predators and because they uncover past actions which should ban an adult from working or volunteering with children.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551 or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Dear Friends,

I wrote to you in August and pledged that I would do all that I can to restore your trust in the Church and to provide a safe environment for your children. This continues to be my priority.

This week, we announced our Independent Survivors Compensation Program, which I believe is another step along the path towards healing for survivors. I believe wholeheartedly that survivors deserve to have their voice heard. They deserve recognition of their pain and suffering. It is our responsibility to offer a solution of our own.

Several weeks ago, Pennsylvania's Bishops announced support of such a program, which was recently discussed but not enacted by the Pennsylvania Grand Assembly. We are therefore moving forward and offering this Program for survivors. Participation in the Program by survivors is entirely voluntary.

The Program will be administered by Kenneth Feinberg and Camille Biros, two leading experts in mediation and alternative dispute resolution. They will oversee the claim process and will have absolute autonomy in determining compensation for survivors. This firm has managed a number of high-profile compensation programs nationwide, including similar programs started by five Catholic Dioceses in New York. This Program will review cases quickly and efficiently to provide compensation to survivors, so they can continue along the path towards healing.

There will also be an Independent Oversight Committee to oversee the implementation and administration of the Program. To be clear, the Diocese will have no authority over this committee.

It is important for you to know that parish and school assets, as well as contributions and bequests from parishioners and donations to the Diocesan Annual Appeal, will not be used to fund the Program. Rather, we will use available reserves and will sell assets and borrow money as needed. We will strive to maintain our core mission to serve the local community. Our commitment to the people of the Diocese of Scranton remains true.

The Diocese continues to refine the Program so that it better serves survivors. Further details concerning the Program will be made available in the near future, including a website for survivors to obtain information and claim forms.

Thank you for your attention. Please continue to pray for survivors, their families and the community at large.
