HOPE AND FORGIVENESS

There were some interesting conceptions of sin prevalent in the time of the Hebrew scriptures. There was the belief that God punished sin immediately. Those who suffered disease or misfortune were, therefore, sinners getting their due from the Almighty.

Today's first reading hints at another kind of God. When David admits his sin, Nathan declares, "The LORD on his part has forgiven your sin" (2 Samuel 12:13b). Here was not a vengeful God but a merciful God. What good news that must have been to David and those who, like him, could be honest enough to admit their sinfulness!

Jesus is the good news of God's mercy and forgiveness incarnate. Without Jesus, perhaps the good news would have been too good to believe, too difficult to imagine. But there he is in today's Gospel, the God-man, forgiving a sinner and declaring that she is forgiven because of her great love.

TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — The LORD forgives David for taking the wife of Uriah, and for having Uriah killed (2 Samuel 12:7-10, 13).

Psalm — Lord, forgive the wrong I have done (Psalm 32).

Second Reading — If justification comes through the law, then Christ died for nothing (Galatians 2:16, 19-21).

Gospel — Jesus forgives the woman because of her great love (Luke 7:36 - 8:3 [7:36-50]).

Mass Intentions

- 1. Masses for a particular deceased person must be taken from the Mass Intention Book first, before a new request can be made.
- 2. Only three Mass Intentions per year for a person from the Mass Intention Book.
- 3. Only ONE weekend Mass intention per year.
- 4. If the deceased person does not have any Masses in the Mass Intention Book, then only one Mass per year can be offered.
- 5. Mass intentions can be offered only by parishioners.
- 6. Some Masses in the Mass Intention Book can be distributed to another priest to be offered. Religious orders, retired priest or priest needing Mass Intentions may be recipients of some Mass Intentions.

The Mass Book for 2017 will open Friday, July 1st.

Father's Day Cards are available. If you wish to remember your father or relatives in the Father's Day Masses you can obtain the card for living fathers and the envelope for deceased fathers (on the table in the back of the Church and side entrance), place the envelope in the collection basket or bring it to the Rectory during Office Hours.

Liturgy Corner: Did You Know? Water

A source of life and cleansing agent, it gives us new birth in Christ and washes us free from sin in baptism.

Blessing ourselves with holy water from fonts at the doors of our churches and the use of the rite of sprinkling in our liturgies invite us to remember our own baptisms and resolve again to live as true Christians.

Water is sprinkled on the caskets of deceased at funerals to remind us of that person's baptism – his or her participation in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ.

In addition to these baptismal uses, water is used in other ways at liturgical celebration:

It is mixed with the wine for consecration since this is the way wine was drunk in Jesus' time.

It is poured over the hands of the presiding priest at Mass that he might be ritually clean as he offers the Eucharistic Prayer I our name.

It is used to ritually cleanse the vessels after communion.

It is used in the *mandatum* or rite of washing feet on Holy Thursday to remind us that as Christians we are called upon to render with love the most humble of service to our brothers and sisters.

Discern Your Gift

By virtue of the fact that we have all been baptized we are called to Christian Ministry.

When it comes to the liturgy we are all called to participate fully, actively and consciously in the liturgy ... whether it be the Mass or Evening Prayers or other forms of the liturgy. When we come together we all exercise the ministry of the assembly: those in the pews and those with other specific ministries.

The ministry of the assembly is very important...so we put away our cellphones, Novena books and rosaries during the Mass and immerse ourselves in the beauty of the prayer as we listen to the Word and other prayers, enter into dialogue with the presider and sing.


Protecting God's Children for Adult Program

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report thematter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being.
