Mass Intentions

- 1. Masses for a particular deceased person must be taken from the Mass Intention Book first, before a new request can be made.
- 2. Only three Mass Intentions per year for a person from the Mass Intention Book.
- 3. Only ONE weekend Mass intention per year.
- 4. If the deceased person does not have any Masses in the Mass Intention Book, then only one Mass per year can be offered.
- 5. Mass intentions can be offered only by parishioners.
- 6. Some Masses in the Mass Intention Book can be distributed to another priest to be offered. Religious orders, retired priest or priest needing Mass Intentions may be recipients of some Mass Intentions.

The Mass Book for 2017 will open Friday, July 1st.

Liturgy Corner: Did You Know? Altar Linen

Before the liturgical reforms of Vatican II, three linen cloths had to cover the altar for Mass – two undercloths and a white top cloth known as a fair linen.

In addition to that, a smaller linen called a corporal was placed upon the altar just before the consecration to collect any crumbs and drips that might result from the Eucharistic action.

Today the altar is usually covered with one cloth of any worthy material. This cloth may cover just the table top of the altar or the top and sides, or it may be one of those full covers called Jacobean or Laudean frontals that surrounds the entire altar I fabric.

The Roman Missal does specify, however, that if the cloth is of a colored fabric, a white one, the size of the table top, is to overlay the colored cloth.

The instructions for Mass still call for a corporal as the specific cloth on which to rest the bread and wine to be consecrated. The word corporal comes from the Latin word for body.

Protecting God's Children for Adult Program


This training session is required for all adult employees and volunteers who have direct contact or routine interaction with children.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has

cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual wellbeing. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551) or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M.
