The letters RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. The meaning? It is a process through which persons seeking the Christian life through the Catholic Church become members of the Church.

Flowers

Historians tell us that flowers were used to embellish the worship space as far back as the time of the Roman Empire when the faithful gathered to celebrate in the catacombs.

Fragrant and colorful flowers impart a sense of festivity and joy to liturgical celebration and are always appropriate except during the preparatory and penitential seasons of Advent and Lent.

Flowers should not be placed on the altar; however, since the table is reserved for the action of the Eucharist, and nothing but fresh flowers should ever be used.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at

www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being.
