PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Matthew 22:1-14

What made the king's invitation so distasteful to these guests? According to the parable, either the guests were too busy with their business, or else they were downright hostile to the entire idea. What could possibly explain this resistance? Perhaps we have a clue in the puzzling conclusion of today's Gospel. One of the second- string guests pulled in from the streets came to the feast "not dressed in a wedding garment." This "wedding garment" calls to mind the preparation of our souls necessary to join in the great "wedding feast of the Lamb" (Rv 19:9), that is, heaven. This man was apparently just too lazy to get ready. He should have demonstrated his gratitude by dressing appropriately.

Now, where do we fit in? Are we more concerned with worldly work than with spiritual growth? Are we offended by the very suggestion that we might need to "dress up" our souls? Jesus gave his life to open the gates of heaven for us. Let's show our gratitude by preparing radiant, beautiful souls worthy of the heavenly wedding feast.

Justice Notes:

To be invited to dinner is a form of hospitality as old as the human race. Sitting around a table, eating and drinking, is a way to share our lives with each other and show that we care. When we are shown hospitality, we always become more receptive to others because they have shared a part of themselves.

Hospitality is a component of stewardship that can never be trivialized. How we treat people is important not only when it comes to larger affairs, such as helping those in need, comforting the distraught, or doing a favor for someone, but also in our everyday interactions. If every breath we take belongs to God, then at every turn our interactions with people have the potential of bringing someone closer to the source of that breath.

This reality hit me the other day in the grocery store. I was in the checkout line with a cart full of items. While waiting, a woman came up behind me with two bags of chicken tenders and a baby in her arms. I offered to let her cut in front of me. She was so grateful but equally surprised someone would offer that to her. My simple action that day didn't lead to a fullblown evangelizing event. But it could have and sometimes it does.

Everyday stewardship means that when we see all aspects of our life as gifts from God, then in the ordinary we see opportunities for the extraordinary. In a grocery checkout line, on the bus, and walking across a college campus, we find chances to do something extraordinary. We have a chance to raise the mundane to a level where God can be noticed. In this reality, the heart of real hospitality is found.
