Bernardine Hall Renovation Fund

The Bernardine Sisters gave 104 years of service as teachers to the children of Saints Peter and Paul Parish. In 2015 the former cafeteria was renamed Bernardine Hall in their honor. It has been many years since any work has been done. For the next 3 years we will be focusing on sprucing it up and making the necessary repairs. (Lighting, heating, electrical, air and a cosmetic face lift) Please consider joining together to make this possible. Money can be sent in at any time

throughout the next three years to fund this project. To date we have received contributions from 175 families in the amount of \$29,622.

What is the liturgical Year?

The liturgical year is the structure within which we celebrate the various aspects of the mystery of Christ's passion, death and resurrection. The key to this structure is Sunday, the first day of the week, the day of the resurrection, and the day on which we regularly celebrate the paschal mystery.

Sunday is the original holy day. All other feasts and solemnities flow from our original celebration of Sunday. The first "holy day" to develop after Sunday was Easter. Easter was at first a two-day and then a three-day celebration which we now call the Triduum. The forty days of Lent soon developed as a preparation for the Triduum and a time of fasting and prayer for those who would be initiated into the church at the Easter Vigil. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday.

The Pentecost season—the fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday—also developed from the Triduum as a way to emphasize the importance of Easter and as a time of sacramental catechesis for the newly initiated.

Christmas is the other high point of the liturgical year, which, "next to the yearly celebration of the paschal mystery, the Church holds most sacred..." Christmas celebrates the incarnation of Christ. Christmas is not a day but a season that extends from the Christmas vigil on December 24 to the feast of the Baptism of the Lord in early January the two-fold character of being a time to prepare for the memorial of Christ's first coming and a time to prepare for the memorial second coming at the end of time. Advent consists of four Sundays, and the first Sunday of Advent is the beginning of the liturgical year. The rest of the year is known as Ordinary Time. The word "ordinary," in this case, comes from the word "ordinal." But these Sundays are also ordinary in

case, comes from the word "ordinal." But these Sundays are also ordinary in the sense spoken of before. It is Sunday that is the lynch pin for the liturgical year. In the seasons and holy days of the year, we celebrate different aspects of the life of Christ. But in our ordinary Sunday celebrations, week after week, we celebrate what it is to be ordinary Christians. We are a people who mold our lives after the one who died, who rose and who will come again.



Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time November 18, 2018

"Brothers and sisters: Every priest stands daily at his ministry, offering frequently those same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But this one offered one sacrifice for sins, and took His seat forever at the right hand of God. Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer offering for sin."

Jesus is our high priest. When we come to mass our priest leads us in prayer, but he acts only in the person of Christ. It is Jesus who offers the sacrifice of Calvary. Sometimes we know the priest quite well. At times a visitor or missionary celebrates the Eucharist for us. How special it is that we have someone to, in the words of St. Peter, 'to lead us to God.'

May we reflect for a moment on the person of the priest. Pray for him, offer him your friendship and support, express your gratitude for his role in leading, teaching, preaching and living the gospel. Encourage others to follow Christ on the service of the community. Remember your priests who have died, asking the Lord to reward them for their ministry. Although a priest is often at our side at moments of sickness and death, it is often said that the priest dies alone. Pray for priests .

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551 or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V. G., at 570-207-2269

Dear Friends,

I wrote to you in August and pledged that I would do all that I can to restore your trust in the Church and to provide a safe environment for your children. This continues to be my priority.

This week, we announced our Independent Survivors Compensation Program, which I believe is another step along the path towards healing for survivors. I believe wholeheartedly that survivors deserve to have their voice heard. They deserve recognition of their pain and suffering. It is our responsibility to offer a solution of our own.

Several weeks ago, Pennsylvania's Bishops announced support of such a program, which was recently discussed but not enacted by the Pennsylvania Grand Assembly. We are therefore moving forward and offering this Program for survivors. Participation in the Program by survivors is entirely voluntary.

The Program will be administered by Kenneth Feinberg and Camille Biros, two leading experts in mediation and alternative dispute resolution. They will oversee the claim process and will have absolute autonomy in determining compensation for survivors. This firm has managed a number of high-profile compensation programs nationwide, including similar programs started by five Catholic Dioceses in New York. This Program will review cases quickly and efficiently to provide compensation to survivors, so they can continue along the path towards healing.

There will also be an Independent Oversight Committee to oversee the implementation and administration of the Program. To be clear, the Diocese will have no authority over this committee.

It is important for you to know that parish and school assets, as well as contributions and bequests from parishioners and donations to the Diocesan Annual Appeal, will not be used to fund the Program. Rather, we will use available reserves and will sell assets and borrow money as needed. We will strive to maintain our core mission to serve the local community. Our commitment to the people of the Diocese of Scranton remains true.

The Diocese continues to refine the Program so that it better serves survivors. Further details concerning the Program will be made available in the near future, including a website for survivors to obtain information and claim forms.

Thank you for your attention. Please continue to pray for survivors, their families and the community at large.
