Help Reach Out To God's Special Needs People

You can become part of an organization that has been reaching out to special needs People since it founding in 1904. The Order of Alhambra is an organization of Catholic men and women that has as its most important mission to do things for special needs children and adults. It promotes social, fraternal and intellectual associations and through its Caravans provide a practical means to form enduring fellowship and friendship among its members while raising funds to achieve the Order's goals and objectives of assisting persons with intellectual disabilities. Its name comes from the castle of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain, who commissioned Columbus for his voyage, and the fez worn by members bears the symbol of the red tower of the Alhambra in Spain. The local chapter, known as Alhamar Caravan #4, hosts an annual picnic for developmentally disabled and conducts programs and provides assistance to St. Joseph's Center in Scranton and the White Haven Center at Christmas time. Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (Childline) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Joseph DeVozoa at 570-862-7551 or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M.
