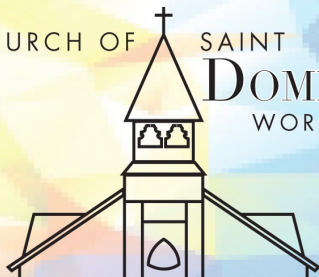

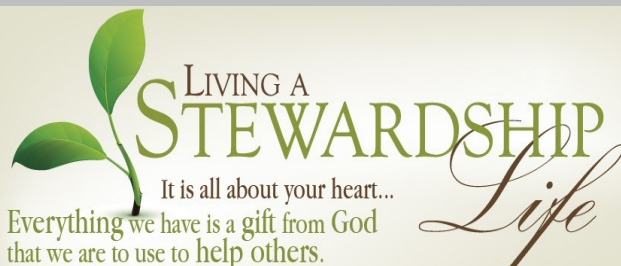

PARISH CEMETERIES

As the spring weather begins, and we look towards a great summer, one annual concern is the upkeep of our Parish cemeteries. As it stands, **we have five cemeteries** (Sts. Peter & Paul, Sacred Heart, St. Francis, St. Joseph, & St. Dominic) and we **do not have any cemetery staff**. We rely on a costly contracted service to cut the grass at each cemetery during a 6 month period.

Please keep in mind that anything other than that costly contracted service, we only have one groundskeeper to take care of the four buildings and grounds at Sts. Peter & Paul church, the two at St. Dominic, in addition to the five parish cemeteries. After a burial, we need to allow the ground to settle. Digging a hole and burying something foreign in the ground naturally causes the ground to settle and form holes around the object. This is an annual and natural occurrence. We appreciate your patience and understanding as we only have one person to maintain the five cemeteries, dealing with the settling ground, inclement weather, and other obstacles. The only way we are able to fill in the holes is with the church's one pickup truck, which cannot physically get to every single grave, so most of it is done by hand. In addition to the settling ground, please keep in mind that any seasonal items/decorations on graves need to be removed or they will be disposed of (which adds more time and maintenance to the groundskeeper). Adding additional stones/statues around a grave also makes upkeep and grass cutting more difficult. One other thing that has been brought up is people leaving beer cans on graves, which is not permitted, so please refrain from doing so. For these reasons, we have added a cemetery envelope every month. It is one of the greatest needs we're facing right now. If anybody is interested in offering help with care and maintenance, we will gladly accept all help.

THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

First Reading: Exodus 24:3-8

Moses explained to the people the commandments he had received from God. Upon hearing them, the entire community immediately agreed they would do as God had told them. Moses then sacrificed young bulls and sprinkled the people with their blood, calling it the blood of the covenant they had made.

Second Reading: Hebrews 9:11-15

Jesus did not offer God the blood of sacrifices, but instead he offered up his own blood to cleanse all people of the transgressions they had committed under the first covenant with God. Christ instead brought a new covenant, which, if kept, would lead to eternal life.

Gospel: Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Jesus sent two of his disciples to prepare the Passover supper. During the meal he blessed bread and offered it to them saying, "This is my body." He then offered them wine and called it his blood, "the blood of the covenant, to be poured out on behalf of many."

"While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, 'Take it; this is my body.' Then he took a cup, gave thanks, gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, 'This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many.'"

The scene is familiar, the moment most solemn. How often we relive, re-present this moment as the one saving sacrifice takes place in our presence today.

The gesture of taking, blessing, breaking and sharing occur in front of our eyes, as Jesus speaks and says 'take' and tells us of the blood of the covenant, sealing our relationship with Him.

On this special day in the life of the church, the Sacrament of the Eucharist is what brings us together and makes us one with the Lord. How essential that we not only honor His presence in the Eucharist, but receive the gift He provides for me. He is truly honored when we reverently reach out to receive Him.

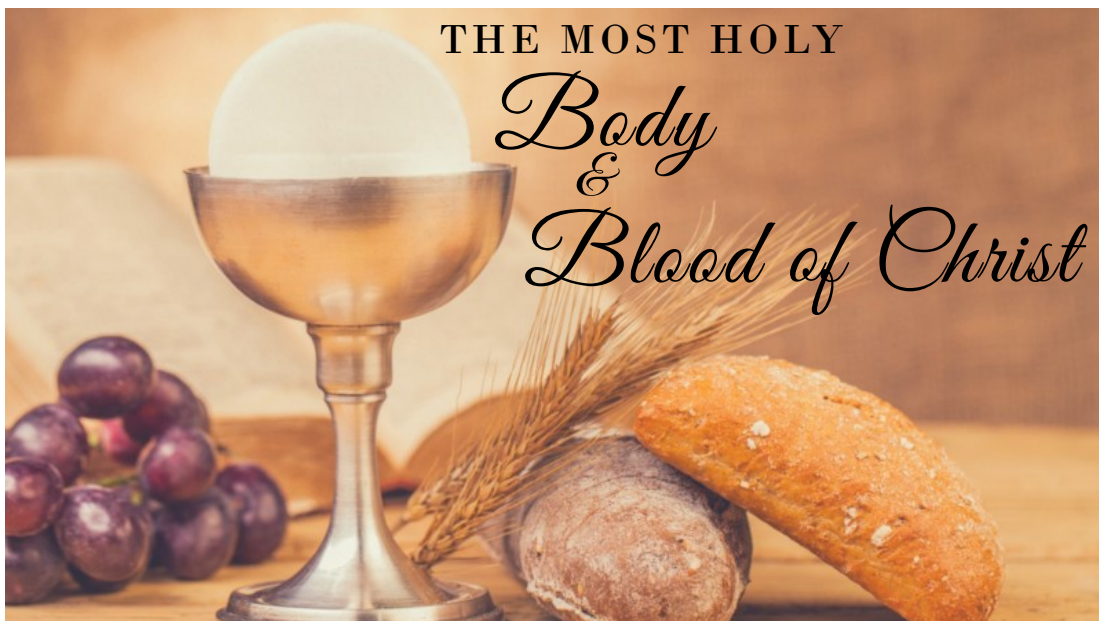

Dedicated to the mission of ending capital punishment, Catholic Mobilizing Network works to incorporate the principles of restorative justice into the U.S. criminal justice system through prayer, education, and advocacy. In 2019 Catholic Mobilizing Network fostered discussion and raised awareness of injustices in capital punishment by creating a study guide to accompany the film *Just Mercy*. The film describes how, in 1988, Walter McMillian was convicted and sentenced to death in Alabama for a crime he did not commit. *Just Mercy* presents the true story of his quest for justice, and the study guide empowers viewers to examine the story through the lens of Catholic teaching on racism, criminal justice, and poverty—elements that impact the issue of capital punishment.

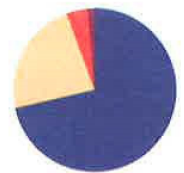

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24 hour Child Abuse hotline (Childline) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary B Pacuska at 570-862-7551
